#### Course Number, Name, and Credit Hours

BI6616 Interpreting the Gospels, 3 credit hours

#### **Course Description**

Examination and utilization of various interpretative methods employed in the study of the Gospels and parables. Exploration of the social context of the gospels and its bearing on the interpretation of various gospel passages. Study focused on one of the synoptic gospels. Analysis of forms in the gospels and the use of parallel passages in interpretation addressed. Application of interpretative results to contemporary contexts achieved through case study method.

#### **Course Objectives**

- 1. Analyze passages in the gospels using various interpretative methods
- 2. Apply socio-cultural trends from the second temple period to passages in the gospels for interpretation
- 3. Evaluate significant aspects of the history of interpretation as part of one's interpretation of specific passages within the synoptic gospels
- 4. Present an argument for Jesus' mission as portrayed within one of the synoptic gospels in relation to socio-cultural trends
- 5. Differentiate the literary, thematic, and theological contributions of each gospel

## **Assignments** (what student does for a grade)

**Guideline for the Discussion Board:** Post your initial response to the discussion question by mid-week (Saturday, 12:00am CDT). Then read and respond to at least **TWO** of your classmates' initial posts by the end of the week (Tuesday, 12:00am CDT).

- 1. **2-1 Reflection Writing:** How does Isaiah 40-55 develop the theme of Messiah? What particular aspects of Isaiah's messiah does Mark intend to invoke in Mark 1:1-15? Write approximately two pages as a reflection of your thoughts.
- 2. **3-1** "Bad Economics is Good Business for Revolutionaries" Worksheet: Compare the 1 century response to poverty of the zealots with Jesus' kingdom of God response in the worksheet provided for this assignment.

- 3. **3-2 "Who's the Messiah" Worksheet:** Compare Luke's birth narrative to Caesar Augustus Good News pronouncement in Luke 2:1-20 in the **worksheet** provided for this assignment.
- 4. **3-3 Exegetical Paper #1:** Choose a passage from the **list provided**. You will apply various interpretive methods to this passage throughout the course. Identify any key words or ideas in your passage which are clarified by Second Temple Judaism or Greco-Roman society. Explain their significance. If your passage alludes to or quotes an Old Testament passage, explain how the passage is being used. (Approximately 1½ pages)
- 5. **4-1 Redaction Worksheet:** Complete the provided worksheet.
- 6. **4-2 Exegetical Paper #2:** Conduct a redaction analysis of your exegetical passage from Assignment 3-3. Answer the following questions: What differences appear? What, if any, significance do these differences have? (Approximately 2 pages)
- 7. 5-1 Interpreting Parables and Miracles Worksheet: Complete the provided worksheet.
- 8. **5-2 Exegetical Paper #3:** Analyze your from passage Assignment 3-3 according to the Narrative model presented by Pennington (pp. 202 for full process). Analysis should be 1-2 pages.
- 9. 6-1 Synoptic Gospel Emphasis Worksheet: Complete the provided worksheet.
- 10. **6-2 Exegetical Paper #4:** Provide the central point of your passage from Assignment 3-3. How does your passage and its central point contribute to the theological theme of the book it is a part of. (Approximately1 page)
- 11. **7-1 Mission of Jesus Paper:** This paper should include two parts: (1) a short summary and an evaluation of Wright's portrait of Jesus (approximately 1-2 pages), and (2) your statement of who Jesus was and why he lived; include comments on a particular gospel passage which demonstrates this understanding (approximately 3 pages).
