BI-3316 Major Prophets 1: Isaiah, 3 credit hours, MDL only.

# **Course Description**

Examines the book of Isaiah, giving attention to historical background and the critical issues surrounding the book while focusing primarily on detailed analysis of the content. Emphasis is on the theological significance of the purpose and message of the book for both Old and New Testaments.

#### Course Goals:

In this course you will:

- Understand the religious, economic, political, and cultural situation into which Isaiah spoke
- Understand the overall message of the book of Isaiah
- Understand the significance of Isaiah for the interpretation of the New Testament, for individual believers, and for the modern-day church
- Understand the nature of Israelite prophecy in its ancient Near Eastern context
- Understand the critical scholarly positions associated with Isaiah

- 1. Describe the major religious, economic, cultural, and political of eighth century Israel
- 2. Compare and contrast Israelite prophecy to that of other ancient Near Eastern societies

- 4. Discuss the major prophetic motifs found in the book of Isaiah and the way in which they contribute to the overall message and flow of the book
- 5. Summarize the critical theories associated with the book of Isaiah
- 6. Apply an aspect of Isaiah to one's personal and ecclesiastical life

#### **ASSIGNMENT #1: BOOK REVIEW**

 Write a one to two page critique of Brueggemann's Prophetic Imagination (Note: A sample book review has been provided in Course Resources).

#### **ASSIGNMENT #2: COMPARISON ASSIGNMENT**

 Produce a two to three page comparison of VanGemeren and Brueggemann. You should note major similarities between these two authors. Differences in argumentation and/or terminology should be examined. You should also make a determination concerning which book resonates with them most.

#### **ASSIGNMENT #3: REVIEW OF CRITICAL SCHOLARSHIP**

• Develop a two page discussion of critical views of the unity of Isaiah.

#### ASSIGNMENT #4: EVALUATION OF THE USE OF ISAIAH IN THE NEW TESTAMENT

Produce an analysis of one of three pre-determined verse groupings.
