Course Number, Name, and Credit Hours

NT5504 New Testament Greek II, 3 credit hours

Course Description

This course is a continuation of vocabulary acquisition and functional literacy in the grammar of the Greek New Testament. It includes a study of morphology and syntax in more detail with a focus on exegesis. Selections from the New Testament will be translated. You will continue to develop skill in the proper use of Bible software and digital resources.

Prerequisite: NT-5503

Course Objectives

After completing this course, you will be able to...

1. Understand the basics of biblical Greek grammar and morphology.
2. Review English grammar in order to gain a better understanding of English translation.
3. Pronounce the Greek text accurately.
4. Memorize a list of frequent New Testament Greek words.
5. Translate portions of the Greek New Testament.
6. Investigate the basic tools included in Bible research software.
7. Summarize the basics of Greek exegesis and the use of Greek in ministry.

Assignments

Guideline for the Discussion Board: Post your initial response to the discussion question by mid-week (Saturday, 12:00am CDT). Then read and respond to at least **TWO** of your classmates' initial posts by the end of the week (Tuesday, 12:00am CDT).

Standard for Written Papers: All papers must be in Turabian style. Each page should be approximately 300 words, 12-pt. Times New Roman font on double-spaced lines with 1" margins. Assignment List:

Readings: Read the assigned material in Mounce, *Basics of Biblical Greek: Grammar*. Read the material at the beginning of the week and review it often after the video lectures and during the homework.

Videos: Listen to Mounce, *Basics of Biblical Greek: Video Lectures*. Review the lectures as needed and focus on the material stressed in the lecture.

Tutorials: Listen to Woodall, *Logos and Additional Material*. These short screen captures will illustrate the proper use of Logos Bible Software, the basics of Greek exegesis, and the use of Greek in ministry. This is supplemental and motivational material that is not included in the weekly quiz.

Vocabulary and Grammar Memorization: Learn the vocabulary and grammar presented in Mounce, *Basics of Biblical Greek: Grammar*.

Discussion Board: You will be placed in a Discussion Board group in order to discuss their initial translation work. Each student in the group will be assigned a different translation exercise from the workbook. After an initial study of the material, students are required to post their translation of the assigned exercise along with a detailed explanation of the process they used to complete the translation. Special attention should be given to the new material presented in the chapter.

Workbook Exercises: Once you have a basic grasp of the grammar and vocabulary, complete all the assigned workbook exercises. As you complete the workbook, you may refer to the textbook and the information window in Logos (New Testament references to the exercises are given at the end of the workbook chapter).

Pronunciation: As you work through the homework exercises, pronounce the Greek text for each of the assignments. Follow the pronunciation guide given during the first lesson.

Quizzes: Once you have mastered the material for the week, take a weekly quiz over the lesson. This quiz will include (1) vocabulary in the form of fill-in-the-blank with the English translation, (2) true/false and multiple-choice questions on grammar and forms, (3) parsing, and (4) translation.

Final Exam: A comprehensive final exam will be given during the last week of class. This will cover vocabulary, grammatical forms, parsing and translation.
