TH 1110, The Church and Its Doctrines, 3 hours

Course Description

A foundational course using primarily a Bible Doctrine approach, which surveys basic doctrines of the Church and their implications for the Church. Specifically, the course will survey the following within the context of historic and contemporary Christianity: Theology Proper, Christology, Anthropology, Bibliology, Soteriology, Pneumatology, Angelology, Ecclesiology, and Eschatology. Special attention will be paid to key terms, concepts, and biblical texts. This course is an introduction to, and overview of, basic theology.

Course Goals

In General: The overarching goal of this course is to answer the question, "Who are we at Moody?" Our answer is, "We are Christian, we are Protestant, we are Dispensational."

More Specifically: This course is designed to:

- Provide you with a basic theological framework
- Demonstrate theology's connection to the church, and its relevance to ministry
- Engender a love of theology as the context for worshipful knowledge of God Himself
- Help you understand the theological distinctives of Moody Bible Institute
- Give you an understanding of the basic theological differences in Christianity broadly defined
- Prepare you for advanced theological courses at Moody Bible Institute

Course Objectives

After completing this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Describe the theological perspectives or outlooks of various portions of the Bible
- List the basic categories of Systematic Theology, and explain the central doctrines and key concepts in each
- 3. Identify the important Bible verses or passages connected with various doctrines
- 4. Summarize the basic theological outlooks for various eras of Historical and Dogmatic Theology
- 5. Discuss the relevance of theology for life in the world today, with an appreciation for theological application to contemporary issues

- 1. READING REPORTS: You will be required to read the textbook in its entirety (6 chapters each week for the 48 chapters).

- 3. WEEKLY EXAMS: You will be required to take eight (8) closed-book Weekly Exams. The exams will consist of 25 objective questions (two points each), drawn from the textbook assignment and Mini-Lecture for the week.
- **4. DISCUSSIONS:** You will be actively involved in discussion with your classmates.
